Student Printing (ad hoc) – Alison Meryweather

There will be communications coming about this: This is the order for how students are
to get a document printed: DECCA will be offering printing services for a nominal fee; if
not available at the time of need, then student should go to the library and then to
library/career center.

Principal – Andrea McCormick

- She let us know that they have revised their SIP goals: content area goal was adjusted to be a math focus since this is their student's biggest struggle. The support structure will remain the same as she reported last month.
- After School Library Opening: average numbers of kids is 14-15 (low of 7, high of 27).
- Student Printing: they have developed "printing guidelines" and have shared with staff to tell students.
- Upper parking lot: this is going away, temporarily for construction of IMS. This is going to happen on April 1st. They have been working on a plan to accommodate just seniors in the overflow lot. Juniors that have permits will be refunded and given options for off campus spots to park.
- Kelly Crickmore has asked us to donate a few more pictures books for LRC2 students.
 Please drop off in the office.
- Principals and PTA meeting: she shared with the group that she is most impressed with IH PTSA's generosity to our in need population. She is also very thankful for getting information from parents first about issues they may have.
- It was brought to Andrea's attention that not all teachers are playing I-Vision; this is a very important mode of communication to students.

Vice Principal (re: state testing) - Tim Krieger

State testing: lots of changes this year. Every student needs to pass state test in reading, writing, math and science. He went over the new requirements for 2015, 16, 17, 18 and 19 graduates. They will begin implementing Smarter Balance this year. For a full list of testing dates, follow this link:

Some of the highlights include:

O Standardized tests are aligned to what students are learning in the class. These tests serve as independent, objective measures of how students are doing. Clear, understandable test scores help teachers and parents work together to adjust their approach and better meet students' needs. Standardized tests also provide data that we use to determine, for example, what's working in special education, or whether race-or income- based achievement gaps continue to persist.

- Smarter Balanced tests assess the state's new Common Core learning standards. Both the standards and the new tests require students to apply their knowledge to real-world problems and write persuasively. The new tests will be administered online, giving students a better testing experience and returning results faster so teachers and parents can use the results to help students.
- Our current state exams measure basic skills. Smarter Balanced, reflecting Common Core standards, tests students at a college-and-career readiness level. Beginning in grade three, students are assessed to be sure they are on track to be college and career ready when they graduate from high school.
