So, looking forward to meeting you all face-to-face sometime soon as well.

Jordan Frost (ASB Director): Hi, Issaquah High families, my name is Jordan Frost and I'm the new Activities Director here at Issaquah High. Rama:

Hi, my name is Rama, and I'm going to be a sophomore here at Issaquah High School, and how I stayed organized during COVID and this whole thing going on, I had a planner and I wrote everything in it. If I did not write anything in it, I would forget everything. I had to check stuff off, and that's how I kept track of my assignments, what I had to do for that day, everything like that.

"What advice would you give a 9th grader to help them be successful in their high school career?" I would probably say to like, just be yourself, and like not be, like get to know everybody, get to explore, go to clubs, do all assemblies, go to football games, like just go out and have fun, cause high school, it goes by quickly. I noticed that my freshman year, so especially with COVID going on, you want to get out there, so you don't lose connections to everybody and you just wanna explore.

Alex:

Hey guys, my name is Alex Benis, and I'm gonna be a senior next year at Issaquah High School, and the first question that I have is "Did you have any habits that were negative in an online school setting that you would change this year?" That's a great question because last year we were all kind of thrown into it at the last minute and next year, luckily we have more time to plan and hopefully figure stuff out. So, my thing was I really procrastinated. When I was getting my work done, I would basically screw around the whole day and then like, the last, like, you know, 9 o'clock, I'd start doing my work. That was a terribly idea, and I don't recommend it. Since we have a more structured setting, and we have, you know, an actual schedule, you're gonna have time to plan out your day, and sort of treat it like a normal school day, treat it like you were just in the building. It's just the only difference is that you are at home at the computer.

So my second question is "Do you have any suggestions on how to connect to other students in our virtual environment?" And I totally understand that a lot of you guys don't wanna do any, like, contact stuff, don't wanna do anything face-to-face. You kinda wanna stay in your house and stay safe. Totally understand that. Something that I did, I oftentimes would have Zoom meetings with my friends, or relatives, I would always, even though I wasn't face-to-face with them, I always made sure to keep in touch. I always made sure to talk to them on a daily basis. The worst thing you could do is to isolate yourself. It's the worst thing you could do for your mental health. So you just want to make sure you stay active with your friends, and even if you're not meeting with them in person, you want, you want to somehow talk to them. And if you're a 9th grader coming in , nervous for high school, I totally understand that as well. My advice to you would be meet who you can, like through relatives, through friends. Even if you don't know a lot of people in high school, try to make as many connections as possible, because once this whole thing is over, and we're back at school, you're gonna value the connections you made online, doing what you can now. Everyone's kind of in the same boat here, and you know, the best thing you can do is try to make friends online, try and meet people from our school, and make sure to carry those relationships when we're back in person.

Grace:

Hi, my name is Grace, and I'm gonna be a senior this year, and the question is, "What are some habits or study skills that helped you be successful in online class?" I know for me, I had to have all my things planned out in front of me, so I used a giant white board, and I had it organized by day and by color. Now that works for me, but just seeing that – what I had to do laid out – helped me so much, especially when I was doing school, to look up and see what I had to do. That can also work in the form of a smaller planner, if that works for you. But not seeing classes face-to-face makes projects super hard to remember, so making sure that they're all out in front of you helped me so much.

My second question is "How is high school different from middle school?" High school is different from middle school because you get to specialize in what you like to do. In middle school there are usually two options, the honors version of the class and the regular version of the class. In high school it's totally different. For a history class for example, there are so many options that you can pick, that you think best suit your learning style and what you're interested in, and that way you get to learn a lot about what you really like to do.

Devon:

My name is Devon and I'm going to be a senior at Issaquah this coming school year. So my first question here is "Describe an extracurricular experience that has been positive at IHS. How do you think you can connect to this group now?" So, a month or two into my freshmen year, I actually joined the Issaquah Robotics Society, which is our high school's robotics team and I've been on it for what would be now my 4th year. I absolutely love it there. It's a really wonderful kind of family, everyone's super connected, you can find so many friends, everyone's super welcoming, and we're super excited to hopefully try and get some new students this year, even with all of the COVID complications. Right now, most of how we're kind of contacting

outside people is through our website which is team1318.org. That's how all of our emails and contact information is up there and you can kind of shoot someone your information if you're interested in joining. And we're doing a lot of virtual meetings, so it will be kind of hard and rough and a little bit of an awkward transition but we really hope that you guys stick around with us because it's tons of fun when we're actually in person.

Next we have at "What are some healthy behaviors that you have that are helping you to cope during the time away from campus?" So, when school was in session, the biggest, most important thing was having a schedule. So, kind of waking up at the same time, and then doing homework for the same amount of time, because if I didn't kind of maintain that , there was really no structure in my life and in what I was doing. I kept two planners at the time. I had a school planner, and I had another, like, events calendar to keep up with what my clubs were doing virtually and what my sports were doing virtually. Another thing is just contact with people. The first month of so of quarantine, I didn't talk with anyone and it was kind of miserable. So, just Facetime, calls, I set up Zoom calls with friends, we played, like, video games over it, stuff like that. It's tons of fun and it's super-duper important because you don't really notice that you're missing it until it, kind of, really starts tolling on you.

Bez:

Hello, everyone, I'm Bez. I'm a rising senior at Issaquah High School and my first question is, "What do you specifically like about Issaquah High School?" So, what I would say, these four years, I feel like what mainly made me want to go to Issaquah high school is all my classmates and friends here. It has a really nice, friend community here, and I was just saying you can always find new people to hang out with and talk to. And I also think a lot of my teachers are really outgoing, really helpful for any problems I would have in class or like, any questions I had. They always had extra office hours and especially, like, AP classes --- take your office hours, come after school, because your teachers are really out there to help you. I remember especially during the quarantine, I had a lot of my teachers email me because I, kind of, procrastinated a lot, too, and so they always wanted to check up on me to see how everything was going and they were always, like --- they really do care about you even if they don't show it, they will. So, the teachers and a lot of the classmates are what I like about Issaquah High.

What my advice for 9th graders would be is --- It is, like, a new area, a new community going into high school. However, you are going to be with a lot of people that you already know from middle school, so you should always have that, kind of like, idea in mind -- that it's like --- high school is just your middle school but you know, there are little bit more things about responsibility. So you should stick close to the people you know, not be afraid to hang out with other people. Always get close with your teachers, 'cause you're going to learn a lot of new material that you're not really sure of. A lot of teachers are here to help you, so that is a really good thing. And if you're also a 9th grader, be open to going to games, be open to going to concerts, be open to going to musicals. There are so many things you can do

at Issaquah High School. And then joining clubs --- there's just a lot of new ways that you can meet people which would really enlighten your entire high school experience.

Vanessa:

Hi, I'm Vanessa and I'm in 12th grade, and my question is "What are you most looking forward to when you can return to campus?" I'm looking most forward to seeing my teachers and my friends and being able to interact with people, and kind of maintain those face-to-face connections,

My second question is "What do you specifically like about Issaquah High School?" I like the school because it's surrounded by a pretty environment, And also, all the teachers are very friendly and helpful and there is a lot of clubs that are great for anyone to fit into.

Doris:

Hi, my name is Doris, and I'm going to be an upcoming junior. So the question is "What advice would you give an incoming 9th grader to help them be successful in their high school career?" I would definitely say don't be afraid to ask for help from your teachers. That's definitely very, very important. Your teachers don't know where you are in the course, necessarily, so you definitely have to go to them to ask for help. They don't know just looking at you if you need help or not, so that's definitely very important. And also, staying organized is very important because you have so many assignments from different classes and it's really hard to keep track of them sometimes. So it's really important to stay organized using a planner or like, a calendar.

So "describe how you can engage with teachers virtually." In terms of engaging with them virtually I would say definitely go into their office hours. Many teachers will have maybe like, Zoom calls for office hours or Microsoft meetings for office hours. And if you need to reach out to them outside of office hours, definitely email them. Don't be afraid to go in and ask. They are not scary, and don't be scared to go ask them for help!

Principal Andrea McCormick:

Alright, my question is "What is one thing that is my favorite about IHS that you all can look forward to when we're back face-to-face?" I don't have one, exact favorite thing, but what my favorite thing is watching students in the events that they personally feel connected to. So whether that's me attending one of our amazing plays or musicals and watching the student performances there and how excited those students are to just be a part of that program or whether that's watching our robotics students hold an event here on campus and which is what really gets them excited, whether that's attending a sporting event, one of our great music performances, choir, orchestra or band --- all those things --- watching students find something they are passionate about and that they're connected to at IHS and watching them flourish in whatever program it is they love the most.


