
EARLY LEADERSHIP EXPERIENCE

CLUBS/ACTIVITIES

- Clubs are still active right now and your student CAN join! They are all virtual, but many national organizations (DECA, NHS, JSA) have adapted their models for a virtual setting.
- Our co-curricular programs (Band, Orchestra, Journalism, Yearbook) are also still functioning, just in an altered way. Many of those programs are still exploring what it means to be active during remote learning.

ADDRESSING \$\$\$

- We've seen a significant reduction in income this school year.
- We reduced the ASB fee to just \$30, given sports are not currently happening. We do plan to charge the other \$30 if sports return to play this school year. For now only students who are active in a club/activity need to pay the \$30.
- The Yearbook will still be produced, and the price will be reduced.
 Our yearbook advisor is still working on what that price will be.
 We will be sure to communicate that out once we know!

ASB IS STILL WORKING HARD!

- Virtual assembly September 23rd (will be accessible on our YouTube channel!)
- Currently running a **food drive during materials distribution**. Families can drop donations off at the front entrance of the school before picking up class materials.
- We will have a **club fair October 16th** so that students can see all of the clubs that are still operating, and find out how to join. This will be held during "NEST" time.
- **Community Service Match Maker** is being developed where students can be matched with community service opportunities in the community. When live it will be on the Activities Website.
- We are working with Bloodworks NW to have a **blood drive in the Fall**. They have adapted their donation model to meet COVID restrictions.
