What is your education background?

Before I decided to get my Master in Teaching, I wanted to test my English teaching abilities and get some traveling under my belt. I joined a program called Greenheart Travel, and lived in Sicily, Italy, as a private English tutor for a family. After that, I got my Masters from Seattle University and was hired at IHS after completing my teaching internship there. It's crazy to think I have been at IHS for nearly 6 years already!



Did you grow up around Issaquah? If not, where did you grow up and did that help shape the person you are today?

I grew up in Port Townsend, WA. It's a very small town, one where everyone knows everyone and their mother. I absolutely loved growing up there and try to go back home whenever I can. Any favorite teaching memories?

There are too many to choose just one! My favorite teaching memories come from those moments in class when students are unapologetically joyful and are having fun. I think there is so much pressure placed on students to excel in every area of their academic life that they forget to find some joy in what they are learning. Those favorite teaching moments that come to mind are those moments when students are still engaging with the work we are doing in class and embracing the process of learning, being vulnerable and willing to try something new. I feel like those are the moments when I can really understand each student as individuals, see their personality, and see what awesome people they are.

Is (was) volunteering part of your life? If so, tell us about your volunteering experiences and what you love about them?

Volunteering was a huge part of my life growing up. One of my favorite experiences was volunteering with Big Brothers, Big Sisters while I was in high school. I mentored a girl in middle school and spent time with her every week. What I really loved about doing that was building a positive relationship with a girl who was painfully shy around people. What started out as an hour of playing Connect 4, mostly in silence, gradually turned into hours of talking about school, playing music, and baking family recipes together. While we both gained a friendship with each other, I got to watch firsthand how she became more confident talking to others. The other students who participated in Big Brothers, Big Sisters became a family unit for her.

What do you like to do outside of school?

Obviously, I love reading (I think that is a given for all English teachers)! Being in quarantine this year allowed me the time to do some of the things that I have been putting aside, particularly, playing the piano. I also love going to long walks, whether it's going hiking in the woods or just walking through my neighborhood.
