What is your education background?

My BA is in History and Psychology from the University of Kentucky; Teaching Certification from Austin Peay State University; MA from the University of Washington from Jackson School of International Studies (South Asia area focus)

Did you grow up around Issaquah? If not, where did you grow up and did that help shape the person you are today?

I didn't grow up in Issaquah – in fact, in my lifetime I've lived in 15 or so different places. My parents are both in the health care field and can't sit still, then I married an Army helicopter pilot. I've taught for 4 or more years in 4 different districts, so I've been lucky to experience education in quite a few different contexts. I love all of the subjects in Social Studies because they are so unequivocally and obviously relevant. They are also inherently interesting to me and usually to my students. I can't think of a better way to spend my career than exploring these subjects with these young people, who push me to think more deeply and in different ways. They are a delight. Lately I've been teaching AP Psychology and World History, but I've also spent a lot of time teaching Civics and AP Human Geography in the past.

I don't see how I could possibly name one – it's the small, daily interactions that are my favorites. Graduation is always a highlight. Maybe the more interesting memories to report on were fire drills in Alaska at 20 or more below zero and taking my psychology students to the Secret Garden in Las Vegas to learn about operant conditioning in action with dolphins and big cats.

Are you a club mentor or sport coach and if so, what are the best parts of being a mentor/coach for that club/sport? Any memorable experiences you would like to share? I am currently the Debate Team advisor, but since I'm new at that they are mostly advising me.
